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The Gift of Sabbatical

My first response to my upcoming sabbatical is great *thankfulness* to the congregation for this gift.

My second response is *humility*. There are many people who have demanding jobs who will never get a sabbatical.

Why me?

My third response is to acknowledge Hope's *wisdom* in making sabbatical a regular part of congregational rhythm (every four years). Being disciplined about doing the routine maintenance on your car doesn't automatically mean it will last longer. But there is certainly a better chance of it. Similarly, a period of restoration for the pastor is good "maintenance," which increases the likelihood of length of service to the church.

And finally, a fourth response: Sabbatical is not a ready-made phenomenon for which one simply presses a button and it goes. I have to *create* the sabbatical. So, let me tell you some things I will be doing.

I have a reading list of six books. Two of them are on spiritual life: *Prayer* by Hans Urs von Balthasar and *The Awakened Heart* by Gerald May. The latter is a guide to practicing God's presence. *Run with the Horses* by Eugene Peterson is about pastoral ministry. *How to Read the Psalms* by Tremper Longman and *Advances in the Study of Biblical Hebrew and Aramaic* by Benjamin Noonan are resources for biblical studies. Finally, *Healing Haunted Histories* by Elaine Enns and Ched Myers is about the on-going effects of colonization, the Doctrine of Discovery, and moving forward in justice.

I will be doing some Hebrew studies with a retired Old Testament professor who lives in Hesston, to take my language skills to the next level.

I will be taking a drawing class—quite a stretch for someone who is about one level above stick figures.

On my own, I will be continuing my translations of the Gospel of Mark (now complete, but I will be going over portions again throughout the summer) and the Book of Psalms (118 done, 32 to go—about 2-3 more years of work at my pace).

Carole and I will be traveling to Maine in July where we spent our honeymoon. I will also be spending a week in a cabin at Kanopolis State Park—a favorite place.

At home I have the garden, the bike, the guitars, and Fridays with grandchildren. There will also be a few home projects to do. Oh, yes, and I'm trying to remember to rest as several of you have encouraged.

upcoming assembly? Hope is entitled to send 8 people. There are funds available to help off-set some of the costs. Annual Assembly sounds like it's something just for pastors or church chairpersons. It's not! It's for everyone who wants to learn more about what's happening among our Western District Conference churches all the way from Nebraska to Texas! It's also an opportunity to hear from people who know what they're doing in faith formation for all ages, church planting, responding to depression and anxiety among us, and more. Oh, yeah, and Annual Assembly is also for families!

We'll gather at Camp Copass, a kids' church camp with LOTS of recreational options. (Click here for more information about Camp Copass.) We've been apart for too long. A big chunk of our time together will be spent reconnecting with each other through recreation and service for all ages—both active and more quiet options—depending on your needs and preferences. We'll have fun, age-appropriate activities for kids and youth to learn about living the Jesus life, as well as childcare for the little ones. There will also be intergenerational fun.

Adults will have the opportunity to talk to members of a congregation outside the US who want to join as a member church of WDC. We'll also hear the good work of some of our partners in ministry, like Mennonite Disaster Service, Mennonite Central Committee, our seminary and colleges, and more. We will have time to catch up with each other and pray together around tables.

Then we'll worship God, play, and do service projects some more. If you live in the northern part of WDC and don't want to drive, we have reserved some 15-passenger vans. Because we're meeting at a church camp/retreat center, our costs will be increased from the past couple of years. For the sake of fairness, we will each be asked to pay well below the actual cost.
