Too Many Hopes?

Summer life is in full swing – getting kids to camp, traveling to see people and places, the box is set by the back

door to take to the thrift shop (which means that at least one closet actually did get cleaned out!).

Summer has often been a "high hopes" time for me. Ready at the top of my mind are memories of picnics with baked beans and a yummy chocolate bundt cake, lawn chairs by the county lake, childhood trips to the library resulting in a couple of novels laying around the house, the sound of the old window air conditioner droning on as I read them.

If friends/relatives come to visit in the summer, my highhopes kick into gear in a different way – I feel it is for me to make memories like mine happen for others.

People who understand relationships caution us about high hopes. Our expectations strongly influence how we look forward to our summers. Our expectations shape how we will feel about this summer's events even as they happen. Our expectations have the power to shape the memories that stay with us.

So, since expectations are impactful, here are 3 warning signs that we need to revisit our expectations:

- You imagine and look forward to an "ideal" version of your summer plans. If expectations are more realistic, you and those around you will be able to relax and laugh when things don't go according to the perfect script.
- 2. Looking in the rearview mirror of past summer experiences, you have strong critiques, or a resentful or disappointed feeling. Take a moment to examine what hopes you may have brought to a previous situation, hopes about a relationship or a vacation location. Figure out how to let some of those hopes go, or be responsible for a way those hopes could be met in a smaller or different way. No one you have spent time with in the past wants the weight of being responsible for your bad time. Everyone benefits from a fresh start.

3. You depend on one friend or a family member to make the time fun. Who knows what mood various friends or relatives will be in when your paths cross this time. Who knows which other people in your group might be ready for a conversation with you, even though they aren't the most talkative or funny person in the group. And, think about which of your own experiences could be ripe for sharing with someone. Circles of friends and families grow strong from varieties of sharing over time.

At the end of some Augusts, I have taken time to list special moments from the summer just past. How interesting that most entries are small moments and unexpected encounters – a stroll with someone turned out to yield a pretty interesting conversation. Sitting in the heat of the evening with fireflies filling the backyard made a memory, even with no conversation.

Fall schedules get crazy in a hurry – we need the refreshment of summer. With the weeks that remain, let's consider giving up some of our "high hopes" for the summer. The refreshment of life's unprogrammable reality is worth it.
