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Randy's Ramblings

I have a friend who has a cabin she lets me use on occasion. The cabin is small, but functional, with a deck overlooking a pond.

To get to the cabin, you drive through cattle grazing land, over a two-rut driveway that leads from a gate at the road to another gate near the cabin.

The first time I went to the cabin, I followed the two-lane path until I came to a place where the path split. I took the left path and found out why there was another path. A pothole had developed. Nancy tells me they tried to fill the pothole, but it came back; so they started driving around it. But every once in a while, they take the wrong path like I did. Sometimes they simply forgot about the pothole, or a cow was in the way and forced them to land in the pothole. It was nice to know I was not the only one who landed in that pothole.

I think grief is a lot like that pothole. We can try to fill it up ... by keeping busy, or by self-medicating, or by trying to replace whatever we lost with something else. But the pothole will return. Eventually, we learn to "drive around it." But every once in a while, we follow the familiar path and return to the pothole, or something pushes us into the pothole unexpectedly. And I have found that everyone has a similar experience.

We tend to hit the pothole a lot in the early phases of grief, but over time, we are less prone to land in it. I still hit a pothole when I remember my mother who died 10 years ago. It doesn't slow me down like it did at first, and I don't fall into that pothole nearly as often as I did in the early years. When our daughter Melissa died in June, I found that for the first month it was hard to go a full day without landing in a pothole. Sometimes it was a picture. Sometimes it was sitting on the couch where she sat. Sometimes it was seeing a puppy (she always loved puppies). Images, sounds, memories would come to mind and I would begin to weep. It still happens frequently, but less often than it did at first. And I know the day is coming when I will replace the pothole with fond memories and smiles more often than I find my eyes filled with tears as I miss her smile.

Some of us know when we will experience those potholes. Birthdays and holidays are times we will expect it to happen. But I also know people who tell me they "hit

a pothole" when they were writing a check to pay a bill. There was no way to anticipate that sudden memory, but there it was.

I want you to know that "hitting a pothole" is a normal and natural part of grieving. And I can assure you the day will come when you realize you've learned to drive around them. The memories will continue to exist, but they will bring joy, fulfilling the promises given to us in Psalm 126. --Randy Quinn

When he meets up later in life with his idol from childhood, he chronicles Ehrmann's story about suffering a great loss and how it has changed him and challenged him to teach young men a whole new meaning of masculinity through the game of football. There is a retelling of many exciting football games but the major
