It was unsettling, to say the least. We went to dinner with some friends, and when we came home, the clothes rod in the closet had fallen to the floor ... along

with all of the clothes that had been hanging there since we moved in. The shelf above it is also showing a separation at the corner where it meets the other shelf there. We had never noticed that separation before. And when I tried to replace the rod, it was clearly ¹/₄ inch too short.

How can that be? We called the builder. He left scratching his head. He'd never seen anything like it. (Neither have we!) He has since replaced the rod with a longer one, but we still can't figure out how it happened.

It's probably because the house is settling. But that's an unsettling answer. It's unsettling because it happened so suddenly. Most settling of houses happens over time. And the builder agrees there would be other places where we would see evidence of settling. It's unsettling, and I want to have a better answer.

Later that week I participated in a Sunday School discussion where we talked about the Peter Enn's book, *The Sin of Certainty* (Harper, 2016). I've not read the book yet, but I have added it to my list of books I want to read. According to Amazon, the book "models an acceptance of mystery and paradox that all believers can follow and why God prefers this path because it is only this way by which we can become mature disciples who truly trust God. It gives Christians who have known only the demand for certainty permission to view faith on their own flawed, uncertain, yet heartfelt, terms."

My own reflections after our class discussion suggest we all have a desire to be certain about things -- even where there is no certainty. I know there are unsettling stories in the scriptures. I also know that the only thing we can know for certain is that God loves us. Too often, however, we want more than that. We want to be able to sing the children's song with confidence, "I stand alone on the word of God, the B.I.B.L.E." We want to be able to turn to the Bible and find an answer to all of our dilemmas.

Instead, we have a Bible that leaves us hanging, that invites us to experience the mystery as a gift. For the most part, I already knew that. It's only unsettling when I try to explain it. I just wish I felt the same way about our clothes rod!

Medical Ministry International's (MMI) motto stated on their website is, "Providing health care for lasting change." Their mission "is an opportunity to serve Jesus Christ by providing spiritual and compassionate health care in this world of need." Included in their mission statement is John 13:15, "For I have set an example, that you also should do as I have done to you."

January 7-14, my sister Rose Haury and I took the opportunity to join an MMI team traveling to Miches, Dominican Republic, to be general helpers with the surgical team whose purpose was to perform surgeries in the Miches Hospital on residents of Miches who could not afford or did not have access to good health care. I chose to go on this service trip mostly because I strongly believe in serving those in need because Jesus calls us to do so, because I was invited and encouraged to go by Kara Klingenberg (leader of the team), and because I was available since my trip to the Holy Land was cancelled because of the war in Gaza.

I found the people of the DR to be very friendly and gracious, and the country to be very beautiful especially the flowers, the foliage, and the ocean.

As general helpers, Rose and I were assigned to wash the surgical instruments right after they were used in surgery, package them for sterilization in the autoclave, and then sort them into the supply room after they were sterilized to be ready for the next surgeries. Needless to say, I learned guite a bit about surgical instruments and also the good that can be done for others in a simple, basic, and not modern setting.

One highlight among others was the opportunity to be in the operating room and witness several surgeries, one being a gall bladder removal, a surgery I had experienced in 1986 before gall bladder surgeries were performed by laparoscopy as a general rule. The highlight that made the biggest impression on me, though, was the tenderness, kindness, and compassion the MMI medical workers (surgeons, nurses, technicians, anesthesiologist) showed to the patients as they were fulfilling the purpose of MMI. It touched my heart to see the surgeon carry the little ones into the operating room and then back again to post-op after the surgery and the kindness they showed to not only the patients but to their families as well. This kind of medical care, I'm sure, contributed to the comfort and healing of the patients.

The local MMI people were very hospitable and welcoming to us and put great effort into being sure that we were safe in all aspects while we were in the DR. They served us bountiful and delicious meals making sure we were eating "safe" food and drinking "safe" water so that no one would become ill. We started each day with a hearty breakfast and devotions which was a good and inspiring send-off before we headed to the hospital each day. At the hospital each morning before surgeries began, we were introduced to the patients in the waiting room and together we sang several praise songs and were led in prayer. We were treated to a day on the beach after our week of working at the hospital.

The first day we who were new to this group were told that each team becomes a big MMI family which I experienced to be very true. I hope that my assistance as a general helper at the hospital contributed at least a little bit to a good change in a few people's lives in Miches.
