given by our work


Each of us has a name

Showing God's Love

I've been trying to get back into my routine of spending some time with God to start my day. For a while, I had been journaling the Verse of the Day from YouVersion and BibleGateway, but got out of this practice a couple of months ago. This morning, I sat down with my cup of coffee and opened my YouVersion Bible app.

He loves righteousness and justice; the Lord's faithful love fills the whole earth.

Psalm 33:5 (CEB)

This seems like a perfect verse for a skeptic to use in order to argue the exact opposite of what the Psalmist has written. "Why do bad things happen to good people" is at the top of many people's list of issues they have with the idea of God being a God of love, grace and peace. All it takes is a quick perusal of headlines on your phone or tuning into the nightly news (does anyone still do this?) to realize that our world has problems. Where is God's righteousness and justice found in the midst of the anger, oppression, conflict and violence that surrounds us?

How can we understand, let alone agree and celebrate, the notion that "the Lord's faithful love fills the whole earth"? It would seem more appropriate to declare "humanity's despicable thoughts, beliefs and actions infect the whole world". How is God's faithful love filling the world?

The answer to the question, "Where is God's righteousness and justice?" is "Right Here". God can be found in all of us. The Christian tradition holds that once we have experienced the loving grace offered through the substitutionary death of Jesus, the Holy Spirit comes to live in us. Beneath that experience, though, is the underlying foundation that the Bible teaches that we, humans, are created in the image of God. Aspects of God's character, such as his love for righteousness and justice, are found in each of us. Circumstance and choice may make it more difficult for this love to be seen; however, the lack of evidence does not equate to absence.

We can answer the second question, "How is God's faithful love filling the world?" by stating "In Us". It is not just believers, who have an active relationship (or even a relationship on the slide, as I have recently experienced) with the Holy Spirit, who are made in God's image. It is ALL people (even the bad guys!). I am going to go out on a limb and say that all people have the ability to feel and show love, even if it is hidden, truncated or neglected, because we are all made in God's image. It is humanity's presence, throughout the world, that brings at least a bit of God's love to creation.

As we, who have been called by His name, go about our daily tasks, let us work in a way that demonstrates God's love to the world, and demonstrates our, and His, love for righteousness and justice.

Recycling opportunities at Mennonite Central

Committee in North Newton, KS! MCC accepts the



following materials for recycling, cardboard, books, and paper. We also recycle soft plastics (any plastic packaging that you can stretch with your finger, including Amazon mailers and bubble wrap). We also accept and

process wearable clothing, shoes and purses/bags.

However, it is best to donate those items to an Et Cetera Shop first, if possible. When you arrive at MCC, follow the

signs toward the warehouse and you'll find bins outside under the covered roof for each recyclable item. MCC is

EMFs – electromagnetic fields

Over 230 scientists and 40 countries have expressed

serious concerns regarding the increased exposure to EMFs – electromagnetic fields– generated by electric and wireless devices. Exposure is virtually unavoidable in our world today, so protecting yourself as much as possible is essential.

Physical effects include increased cancer risk, accelerated aging, genetic changes, fertility issues, and neurological/brain disorders. Children are particularly vulnerable. Damage goes beyond humans to plant life and animals.

Sources include Wi-Fi, TV, cell phones, appliances, utility meters, Bluetooth, security systems and other smart devices, electric cars, gaming stations, baby monitors, and LED lights.

Some very basic ways to protect yourself are to limit screen time, increase the distance from the device (use the speaker mode instead of holding the phone to your ear and lay the I-pad or laptop on a pillow instead of your lap), disable the Wi Fi when not needed, put phone on airplane mode when not in use, and keep all electronics out of the bedroom. Diets rich in antioxidants, chlorophyll, and magnesium can help mitigate damage to the body.
