Our Hope Mennonite Church Immigration Compassion Team (ICT) has drafted a first-ever Immigration Customs Enforcement (ICE) Response Plan for Hope Mennonite. Hope Vision Council, after another round of reviews, will distribute this draft soon, along with a cover letter, so that everyone has a chance to learn and offer feedback before a congregational vote at the end of January 2026. In addition, Abraham Diaz Alonso, Immigration Program Coordinator for Mennonite Central Committee, has been conducting virtual and in-person trainings on the topic of "Faith in Action: Building Prepared Churches - Responding to ICE and Protecting our Communities". The next opportunity is a virtual meeting on Tuesday, November 25 from 6-8pm. Please consider registering.

"Our churches are called to be places of peace, welcome, and safety for all. Yet, with recent changes to immigration enforcement policies, faith communities are facing new challenges in protecting and accompanying immigrant neighbors.

MCC's Immigration Network invites you to a special **two-hour virtual training** designed to help your church understand immigration enforcement, know your legal rights as a faith community, and develop a plan of action in case immigration agents show up at or near your church community.

Through this training, church leaders will: Learn what "sensitive locations" are and how immigration enforcement policies have changed; Explore how to create a church response plan and understand your rights under the law; Reflect on how our faith calls us to respond with courage, hospitality, and solidarity.
