Mapping Hope

As I get ready for the Christmas Eve service tonight, I'm thinking about geography and maps. There is a great

deal of traveling in the stories and characters of Christmas. Angels travel from mysterious realms, shepherds and magi travel use the navigational system of stars, and soon, the Christ child will travel through the birth canal, only to enter a world of instability and violence. More traveling is ahead for all, including the magi who will need to chart a different path home due to Herod's wrath.

We, too, have much traveling ahead as we navigate our ever-changing lives and world, not to mention our Christmas gatherings this week!. For some, health concerns have forced a new course. Changes in work or family life can also create the need for new maps, new orientation. Violence and instability, often out of our control, necessitate changes in direction, especially as we seek to follow the Prince of Peace.

Jan Richardson asks good questions related to maps. "What's your map look like" she asks. "How would you chart the terrain of your last fifteen years, fifteen months, fifteen days? What landmarks would you note? What stories would your map tell? What are the maps beneath the map of your life—the hidden landscapes, the secret stories that shape the lay of your land? Are there tools you need in order to do some new mapping—to revisit and rethink and redraw the territory you thought you knew, or to change the course ahead?"

What if we would apply these questions to Hope Mennonite Church? What does our shared map look like? Is it time to create new maps together? I ask these questions because I'm starting to wonder if 2026 could be a year of mapping for Hope. This idea is only beginning to take shape, so I don't have more specifics. Plus, for this mapping exercise to work, it would need to be collaborative. Therefore, please start thinking about what such a mapping exercise might look like at Hope as we chart our course for 2026 and beyond. "Are there tools WE need in order to do some new mapping—to

revisit and rethink and redraw the territory WE thought WE knew, or to change the course ahead?"

I pose these questions with some degree of trepidation, especially as someone new to this congregational landscape. A mentor once told me that one of the reasons change is hard is because it feels like a (negative) judgement on the present. By suggesting a mapping project, I don't want people to get the sense that something is wrong and needs to be changed. Rather, I hope we can join together in affirming and making visible what can be affirmed alongside making changes, always with greater faithfulness Jesus' course in mind.

I'll close with more invitations from Jan Richardson.

"As we travel through these Christmas days toward Epiphany and the coming year, where do you find yourself in your map? What are you giving your attention to? Are you looking in a direction that enables you to see possible paths? Is there a turn you need to take in your map? Where might you begin? Who can help?"

And at Hope:

Where do we find ourselves on the course set by Jesus? What are we giving our attention to? Are we looking in a direction that enables us to see possible, more peaceful paths? Is there a turn we need to take in our map? Where might we begin? Who can help?"

All In

The newest venture of Anabaptist Disabilities Network is "All In: Immersive Worship for Everybody," made possible by a grant from the Lilly Foundation.

ADN is inviting 12-20 pilot congregations to go "all in" and join us on a journey of creating accessible, intergenerational worship through a five-year collaborative project. Together we will explore worship practices that engage people of all ages and abilities, such as art projects, dramatic reenactments of scripture, songs, and liturgy that can be learned with repetition. In addition, we will explore other embodied, multisensory practices, including traditional rituals like communion and anointing.



In August of 2025, Hope Mennonite was invited to join a 5-year grant-funded learning cohort through Anabaptist Disabilities Network (ADN).

Initially, Ruth felt hesitant given how many other things were going on this fall. Then she mentioned it to Natalie Graber-Regehr and due her excitement and willingness to take the lead, we barely made the October 31 application deadline. Hooray! (If you don't know, Natalie is a Physical Therapist who thinks about matters of disability and inclusion a lot.)

Since then, we have received word that Hope Mennonite was selected to be part of this grant program. (Hope was one of 19 Anabaptist congregations selected.)

Natalie and Ruth, together with Vision Council and Worship Commission, believe this program will dovetail nicely into our congregational priorities of radical hospitality and support groups for those whose lives are impacted by disability of all kinds.

Quick overview of the grant:

- It's a 5-year grant-funded cohort-based program. It's known as the "ALL IN" program.
- Hope will receive \$2,000 from ADN every year for 5 years. Total=\$10,000
- Among other things, these funds can go toward accessibility and inclusion efforts especially in the context of worship. This is why having Worship Commission support is critical. And while learning with and from children with disabilities is a big part of this venture, this project is intended for people of all ages and abilities and our growth in responding as congregations.
- Natalie Graber-Regehr has agreed to be the project lead for Hope. She (and one other person from Hope) will have an all-expense paid trip to a one-time only in person retreat in PA this coming Spring. Topics will include trauma sensitivity, mental health awareness, different learning emotional/intellectual/physical styles. accessibility in worship, etc.
- Natalie will start to create a working group here at Hope. Together, they will help her/us on how we spend the grant funds and be available for discussion, consultation, and learning and awareness and support around disability inclusion for all ages, especially in the context of worship. If you are interested in being part of this ADN working group, please let Natalie know. Good news is that several people have

already stepped forward, which tells us that this effort meets a need/desire here at Hope.

If this all seems a bit nebulous in your mind regarding purpose and fit here at Hope, you are not alone. This is a new venture for all of the 19 congregations as well

If you are new to Hope and wish to know more about the Family Promise program, please ask any of the coordinators: Marcus Loganbill, Vicki Howard, Elizabeth Anderson. There are numerous roles for volunteers during our weeks of hosting. A one-time online training is required to be a volunteer. Once you are trained, no further training is necessary. Drivers do need to have a background check completed every three vears.



Glyphosate the kev ingredient in Roundup, the most widely used pesticide in the U.S. It is often sprayed right before

harvest to dry out crops, which leads to high levels of contamination in our food. Grains (wheat, oats, corn, soy, barley, and buckwheat), beans and legumes, almonds, pistachios, apples, cherries, oranges, carrots, sweet potatoes, and beer and wine have tested particularly high in glyphosate. Glyphosate negatively impacts the gut microbiome, the central nervous system, and is a contributing cause of cancer.

Even when choosing organic food, it can be contaminated by the chemical drifting in the air. However, shopping organic is still the best option. Always rinse fruits and vegetables very well and/or soak in a baking soda solution for 5-10 minutes, then rinse.

of the Servant will be taking the lead - organizing, gathering volunteers, and providing lunch. The clinic assists individuals who may be facing detention and deportation. Lawyers, working pro bono, will help people receive the legal documents they need to ensure they have provided for the safety of their families and finances in case they are detained or deported.

If you would be willing to serve either morning (8:00 noon) or afternoon (noon - 5:00), please contact Marcus who will submit your name to those in charge of recruiting volunteers. Volunteers help serve coffee and drinks, greet guests and escort them to their attorney, supervise children, and provide lunch and snacks to the volunteers at the clinic. We are also in need of notaries throughout the day.

The location of the clinic has yet to be determined but will most likely be in north Wichita. The clinic is conducted with the cooperation of the Kansas Immigration Coalition, the Balderas Legal Group, and the Wichita Bar Association. Last September, we helped 66 families receive their documentation.
